Growing Inequality

- 50 million Americans currently live in poverty
- The United States has the highest income inequality of the developed world. Behind countries like Russia and Iran.
- Since 1990, CEO pay is up 300%, Corporate profits have doubled, and average worker pay has increased only 4%
- 21.9% of children in the US live in poverty
- The top 1% of Americans hold 40% of the nation's wealth, the top 10% own 80%
- Since the Great Recession in 2007, 95% of income gains have gone to the top 1%

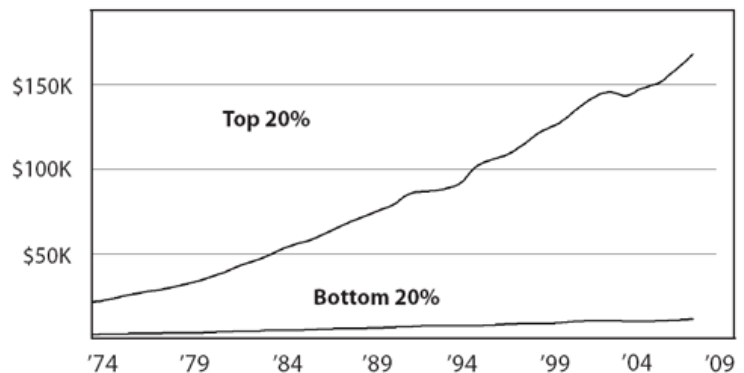
